Dear Friend of the Council,

With our mission as urgent as ever, it was inspiring to see Carnegie Council adapt to meet the unimaginable circumstances of this most extraordinary year.

The velocity of change was matched by the scope of new challenges. The pandemic struck quickly, lingered, and had devastating results. It will no doubt take years to assess the full impact. U.S. politics continued to fragment to the point of near rupture. Fault lines in international relations grew deeper as the Brexit process marched on, America First persisted, and global-scale issues from climate to migration to the future of democracy worsened.

Day-to-day life at Carnegie Council was upended when the pandemic reached New York City in March 2020. As remote work and virtual meetings became necessary, staff and fellows pivoted rapidly and seamlessly, taking advantage of the Council studio capacities in video and audio production, as well as digital publishing.

Despite the obstacles, the Council began to implement its new vision plan already in the works, which chronicles the first steps in the development of new “impact initiatives” including climate governance, U.S. global engagement, artificial intelligence, and migration. # OUR WORK

---

## AI

From the workplace to the battlefield, to schools and hospitals, the uses for artificial intelligence (AI) are endless. These technologies are poised to rapidly develop in the years to come and if left unchecked, they will empower digital elites and new digital alliances. Still, the understanding of exactly how social and technical systems interact and how to govern them globally, regionally, or locally lags far behind. Our priority is to ensure that AI is developed and deployed in a just, responsible, and inclusive manner.

In 2019-20, through our podcasts, webinars, and journal articles, we documented the rise of AI technologies and engaged in substantive discussions about how they will affect all aspects of our lives. Alex Woodson, host of the *Global Ethics Weekly* podcast, interviewed researchers and scientists looking at deep questions about ethics and AI. Three of these podcasts—with Harvard’s Mathias Risse, Johns Hopkins’ Heather Roff, and Western Michigan’s Fritz Allhoff—expanded on articles from the *Ethics & International Affairs* roundtable on AI and global affairs in the Summer 2019 issue. Other podcasts focused on “killer robots,” with The New School’s Peter Asaro; how to build ethical AI systems for the near and far future with IBM’s Francesca Rossi and UC Berkeley’s Stuart Russell; and big data, health care, and surveillance in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic with NYU’s Mona Sloane and Accenture’s Rumman Chowdhury.

When the COVID-19 pandemic forced our New York City office to close in March, Senior Fellow Arthur Holland Michel and Carnegie-Uehiro Fellow Wendell Wallach organized virtual events, moderated by Carnegie Council President Joel Rosenthal, focused on questions about technology and the emerging worldwide health crisis. Wallach discussed how the pandemic could be a new “focal point” for AI researchers, both on the technical and ethical sides. And Michel, speaking after the murder of George Floyd and the ensuing protests,

discussed the confluence of the pandemic and social unrest while humanity grapples with surveillance technologies and AI systems that we don’t yet fully understand.

## C2G

The Carnegie Climate Governance Initiative (C2G) seeks to catalyze the creation of effective governance for climate-altering approaches, in particular for solar radiation modification and large-scale carbon dioxide removal. Its mission will have been achieved once their governance is taken on board by governments and intergovernmental bodies, and when activities such as awareness raising, knowledge generation and sharing, and facilitating collaboration are integrated into intergovernmental organizations such as the UN.

C2G is impartial regarding the potential use of specific approaches, but not on the need for their governance. C2G sees governance as more than laws, rules and regulations: it includes multiple, diverse processes, involving all sectors of society in a process of learning, discussion and decision-making. It is not C2G’s role to influence the outcome of these processes, but to raise awareness of the critical governance questions that underpin approaches.

## Migration

While people are as mobile ever in our globalized world, the movement of people across borders lacks global regulation. This leaves many refugees in protracted displacement and many migrants unprotected in irregular and dire situations. This is one of the most profound ethical issues of this era and several podcasts focused on this in 2019-20.

Michael Doyle, university professor at Columbia University, joined the *Global Ethics Weekly* podcast in September 2019 to discuss the Model International Mobility Convention, a hypothetical document that proposes a framework for the movement of people across borders, including refugees, migrant workers, tourists, and students. The goal of this document, written by Doyle and over 30 migration experts, is to develop equitable and ethical regulations for migration across the world.

Other podcasts looked at the many connections between climate change, the pandemic, conflict, and migration.

## USGE

The bipartisan consensus in American foreign policy around the broad parameters of “pragmatic internationalism” is in serious doubt. The 2016 election of Donald Trump marked the first time in the modern era that a U.S. president fought against this consensus and his presidential campaign also revealed the extent to which the narrative that sustains this view has collapsed for a significant portion of the American electorate. Through podcasts, virtual events, blog posts, and reports, the U.S. Global Engagement program (USGE), led by Senior Fellow Nikolas K. Gvosdev, seeks to: reshape wider discussions on American foreign policy to seriously address the causes and consequences of U.S. disengagement; move ethical considerations to the center of policymakers’ thinking about international relations; and inform democratic citizens’ understanding of international affairs, global engagement, and U.S. foreign policymaking.

Gvosdev kept busy in 2019-20 with podcasts, blog posts, and his October 2019 report “The Search for a New Narrative: Recasting American Involvement in the International System.” As the 2020 U.S. presidential campaigns and then the Democratic primary elections started, the program focused on the foreign policy divide between “restorationists,” like Joe Biden, who look back to Obama-era policies, and the “progressive” candidates like Elizabeth Warren and Bernie Sanders, who champion the Green New Deal and less foreign intervention.

Other topics covered through the program year include the U.S-China trade war, links between climate change and foreign policy, and, as 2020 went on, the effect of the COVID-19 pandemic on international relations. In an April 2020 webinar with Rosenthal, Gvosdev noted the lack of international cooperation in the face of the crisis as solidarity began to weaken between the European Union and NATO states. And podcasts with The George Washington University’s Amitai Etzioni and ADA University’s Damjan Krnjević Mišković focused on the lack of leadership in the early days of the pandemic with the Trump administration setting the example of every nation for itself.

## EIA

The aim of *Ethics & International Affairs*, the quarterly journal of Carnegie Council, is to help close the gap between theory and practice by publishing original articles, essays, and book reviews that integrate rigorous thinking about principles of justice and morality into discussions of practical dilemmas related to current policy developments, global institutional arrangements, and the conduct of important international actors. Theoretical discussions that originate in philosophy, religion, or the social sciences should connect with such interests and concerns as the function and design of international organizations; institutions of accountability; arrangements governing trade and the global economy; as well as issues of human rights, the environment, and the use of force.

In 2019-20, led by editor Adam Read-Brown and assistant editor Priya Chokshi, the journal showcased an exceptional list of contributors covering a broad range of topics. The Fall 2019 issue featured a roundtable on “Economic Sanctions and Their Consequences,” with contributions from Joy Gordon, Idriss Jazairy, and Dursun Peksen. The centerpiece of the Winter 2019 issue was a symposium entitled “Just War and Unjust Soldiers,” with a lead article by Scott D. Sagan and Benjamin A. Valentino on American public opinion regarding the moral equality of combatants. The Spring 2020 issue featured a roundtable organized by Alex J. Bellamy entitled “World Peace (And How We Can Achieve It),” considering how states and societies can build and sustain peace. And the highlight of the Summer 2020 issue was a roundtable organized by Daniel R. Brunstetter on limited strikes and the associated ethical, legal, and strategic concerns.

## CNL

The mission of the CNL program is to cultivate the next generation of ethical global leaders in business, academia, government, and the non-profit sector.

Through Carnegie Council’s public programming, exclusive social gatherings, and special events featuring prominent speakers, CNL gives young professionals the chance to connect with like-minded individuals from diverse sectors and backgrounds and to learn from a wide variety of experts.

In 2019-20, the CNL program also focused on ethics and AI, migration, and climate change through podcasts, meetings, and virtual events. The *Carnegie New Leaders* podcast looked at deep, society-wide questions related to technology through talks with UPenn’s Michael Kearns, Columbia University’s Jason Healy, and U.S. Air Force Major



General Nina M. Armagno. Bard College's Eban Goodstein gave a public lecture on the prospects for a solar-powered future, and CNL members Brian Mateo and Daniela Segovia joined the *Global Ethics Weekly* podcast to, respectively, discuss Vice President Al Gore's Climate Reality Project, and migration in the Americas.

## The Crack-Up

Created and hosted by Carnegie Council Senior Fellow Ted Widmer, this podcast series explored the events of 1919, a year that in many ways shaped the 20th century and the modern world. The series featured interviews with the authors of *New York Times* essays on the legacy of 1919.



While most of the podcasts were in the previous program year, Widmer finished off the Crack-Up series with interviews with Hamilton College's Maurice Isserman on the origins of socialism in the U.S, The University of Chicago's Adam Green and Penn State's Nan Woodruff on the horrific race riots of 1919, journalist Anna Clark on the beginnings of General Motors, and Penn State Altoona's Brian C. Black on a young Dwight Eisenhower. The series finished with a *Global Ethics Weekly/Crack-Up* episode featuring Widmer speaking about his essay on how the modern Middle East was shaped by the events of 1919.

## Global Ethics Day

Held on the third Wednesday of every October, Global Ethics Day, a project of Carnegie Council, provides an opportunity for everyone around the world to explore the crucial role of ethics in their professions and their daily lives. October 16, 2019 marked the sixth annual Global Ethics Day, and it was one of the biggest years yet. By Carnegie Council's count, there were 140+ activities by organizations and individuals in nearly 50 countries. Carnegie Council partnered with the Association of Chartered Certified Accountants (ACCA) and CFA Institute to produce eight interviews with business leaders on the importance of ethics, entitled "Ethics in Business: In Their Own Words" and three shorter compilation videos wrapping up the series. Both ACCA and CFA Institute also organized activities around the globe—including film festivals in Hong Kong and Singapore, and a breakfast discussion at European Parliament in Brussels.
